

Europe External Programme with Africa **SITUATION REPORT - HORN OF AFRICA** No. 606 - 3 February 2025

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Situation in Sudan (per 3 February)

- An explosion at the Sabreen market in Omdurman on Saturday killed at least 56 people and injured over 150 others. The attack was attributed to the Rapid Support Forces (RSF). RSF denies this.
- 75 people were killed in El Fasher on Saturday following airstrikes that hit a transport hub and areas of Kutum and Shangli Tobai, according to the Sudanese Doctors' Syndicate.
- 13 were killed and 36 wounded in Nyala in air and ground attacks on Saturday.
- 13 civilians were killed in an air raid by the Sudanese Air Force on the Al-Hamra Al-Bir mine in North Darfur on Wednesday 29 January. Dozens of others were injured. The mine works on gold prospecting.
- 11 people were killed in the latest round of shelling of the Abou Shouk displacement camp north of El Fasher, North Darfur, by RSF artillery. 11 more were injured. RSF rockets also hit the city of El Obeid, the capital of North Kordofan, resulting in an unknown number of casualties.
- 6 people were killed by Sudanese Air Force aerial bombings targeting two neighbourhoods in the Manawashi area of South Darfur state. In addition, Al-Koma in North Darfur was bombed last week; it is unknown if any people were killed.
- The UN Human Rights Office has verified information that at least 18 civilians have been executed around the Al Jaili oil refinery in north Khartoum. The killings are attributed to Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and allied forces.
- The killings took place after SAF took control of the area on 25 January. All the persons killed originated from the Darfur or Kordofan regions of Sudan.
- The Coordination of Civil Democratic Forces (Taqaddum) is reportedly facing divisions over whether to establish a government in exile. Proponents argue that it would provide a legitimate civilian alternative to the government, and opponents argue it could fragment the coalition and weaken neutrality.

Situation in South Sudan (per 3 February)

- Armed conflicts are escalating between pastoralists and settled communities in Eastern Equatoria state.
 Conflict in Magwi county has reportedly led to retaliatory fighting in Agoro, Chomboro, Obama and Ayiii villages.
- At least 35 people were killed on 31 January in a raid on Dinka Bor cattle camps, stated a community leader. 11,000 cattle were taken. This has led to counter-attacks.

Situation in Ethiopia (per 3 February)

- The Tigray Interim Administration (TIA) introduced legislation which would allow the Ethiopian federal government to intervene in the region in case of deterioration of security or a request by the regional administration, states the Ethiopian Reporter.
- The regulation also recognises the regional, zonal and woreda cabinets that were established in the 2020 elections. TIA officials state that the regulation restores the powers of regional councils and executive bodies. TIA President Getachew Reda denies the report.



- Approximately 85,000 people are being evacuated from Oromia and Afar due to seismic activity. Furthermore, the original evacuation sites have been deemed unsafe and are being moved.

Situation in Eritrea (per 3 February)

- The Eritrean government party People's Front for Democracy and Justice (PFDJ) organised a congress on
 25 January in Germany. The event was held with involvement of PFDJ sub-branches in Germany, as well as the Eritrean embassy in Germany.
- A PFDJ event was also held in Saudi Arabia, according to the Eritrean Ministry of Information.

Regional Situation (per 3 February)

- At least eight civilians were reportedly killed in a drone strike in the Afar Regional State, near the Ethiopia-Djibouti border. The drone strike has been attributed to the Djibouti government.
- The Djibouti government has allegedly been launching drone strikes against the Djiboutian opposition group Front for the Restoration of Unity and Democracy (FRUD) in the Afar region. However, human rights organisations accuse Djibouti of deliberately targeting Afar civilians.
- The Somali government states that key figures of the Islamic State were killed in airstrikes in Puntland supported by the US. In addition, a senior IS commander was reportedly captured.

International Situation (per 3 February)

- The freezing of humanitarian aid by the Trump administration in the United States is heavily impacting Sudan. Many organisations funded by US aid have been forced to shut down. Aid groups received e-mails ordering them to stop working.
- UN High Commissioner for Human Rights Volker Türk responded with deep alarm to the reports of executions of civilians by SAF and allied forces in Khartoum North. He warned that the killing of civilians constitutes a war crime.
- Eritrean President Isaias Afwerki met with an African Union delegation led by Moussa Faki Mahamat, chairperson of the African Union Commission (AUC). According to the Eritrean Minister of Information, they discussed "challenges and future plans" of the AU.
- Switzerland has decided to end aid to Eritrea over Eritrea's refusal to take back asylum seekers whose asylum claim in Switzerland was rejected.
- President of Egypt Abdel Fattah El Sisi met with Mahamoud Ali Youssouf, Djibouti Minister of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation, who is currently visiting Cairo.
- Russia added among others Ethiopia to its list of countries eligible for currency trading.
- Dr Albaqir Mukhtar, celebrated human rights advocate from Sudan, passed away on 23 January due to an illness. Many are remembering Dr Mukhtar and celebrating his achievements.
